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Introduction

D.H. Lawrence was an English novelist, poet, and essayist known for his modernist works exploring sexuality, industrialization, and human vitality. Lawrence's major novels include *Sons and Lovers*, a tale of family conflict and oedipal theme; *The Rainbow* and its sequel *Women in Love*, which examine relationships, societal change; and *Lady Chatterley's Lover*, notorious for its explicit content.

D.H. Lawrence's *Sons and Lovers* (1913) is regarded as a semi-autobiographical novel that examines human relationships between son and mother. The story centers on Paul Morel, a young man and his bond to his mother. Lawrence has produced works like *Sons and Lovers*, *Lady Chatterley's Lover*, *White Peacock*. Paul Morel's Oedipus complex, which is introduced by Sigmund Freud. Oedipus complex is a son feels a deep emotional bond with his mother and may feel dislike toward his father. Freud's theory of psychoanalysis and the concept Oedipus complex, refers to a child's Semi Conscious desire for the opposite sex parent.

Freud studied conscious and unconscious psyche of the human mind. Freud's Oedipus complex suggests that young boys naturally develop a deep emotional bond with their mother and unconsciously begin to view their father as a competitor. As they grow up, this unresolved attachment makes it difficult for them to build healthy romantic relationships in adulthood. This is clearly shown in Lawrence's *Sons and Lovers*, Mrs. Morel, upset and emotionally unsatisfied in her marriage, subconsciously directs all her love, goal and desires onto her sons, William and Paul and transforming them against their father. This paper looks at the topic through a psychoanalytic point of view to explore how longstanding family tensions shape the characters and play a key role in the novel's main conflict.

Methodology

The novel presents Paul Morel's deep emotional attachment to his mother, Gertrude and his hidden rivalry with his father, Walter Morel. Critics point out that Gertrude, dissatisfied, unhappy her marriage pours all her emotional energy into Paul, creating a overly attached relationship that deeply affects his psychological growth. Eventually the novel presents how this intense attachment leads. Scholars analyze this novel using psychoanalytic theory. Although D.H. Lawrence examined Freud's ideas and critics correspond that novel presents a deep understanding of mother issue. The connection between Gertrude, Walter and Paul is seen as the main tension making Paul's life.

Result

This novel tells about Paul Morel, a young man who grows up in a problematic family and his mother is unhappy in her married life, so she turns emotionally near to Paul. Because of this, Paul becomes dependent on her and finds trouble to love other women properly. He has relationship with Miriam and Clara but he cannot commit with them because of his strong connection to his mother. After his mother's death, Paul feels unable to understand surroundings and he starts finding for his own identity.

1. The Oedipus complex

In *Sons and Lovers*, Paul's connection with his mother, Gertrude is the main focus of the novel. Since Gertrude is unhappy in her marriage, she turns all love on Paul. This makes surprisingly emotional connection in him. Paul grows secluded from his father and emotionally connected on his mother in a manner that goes far beyond a normal mother son relation.

2. Mother's Role in His Development

In Paul's life Gertrude Morel is not just only a mother but she gets the main of his emotional world. She manages of who he becomes and, not releasing him to grow independently. Her dreams that never completed instead of releasing them go, she places all the burden onto Paul. This is not love, it is an emotional trap. Because of his connection to his mother, Paul cannot psychological form his own identity. This is called emotional fixation in psychoanalysis, where a person gets stuck in a relation they can never quite break free from. Paul, without realizing this suffers due to this unhealthy relation. He needs permission from his mother. He is not self-reliant. He cannot identify his potential. He shows oedipal tendency, where a son who forms such a deep connection with his mother that it begins to interrupt with every other relationship in his life. Eventually Paul never truly matures. Gertrude quietly but powerfully shapes his identity. Paul never grows into a normal emotionally independent adult.

3. Psychological Conflict and Identity

Paul is a sensitive and enthusiastic young man who genuinely wants to love but his mother's overwhelming presence makes it impossible for him to love someone else with all of his heart. With Miriam his relationship is delicate, spiritual. She loves him and gives herself to him but Gertrude's constant

resentment toward Miriam poisons Paul's feelings for her and with Clara it is more about physical relationship than emotional one. But in this case, Gertrude approves because she knows Clara's complicated marriage means she can never truly claim Paul and Clara realizes that it is merely needed for physical necessities. When Paul's mother dies, Paul's life gets shaken completely. The real tragedy is that Paul had so much love to give but it was consumed by his mother. Every woman he tried to love lived in his mother's shadow, and none of them ever stood a chance.

The novel is largely autobiographical Lawrence uses Paul's story to explore how an over controlling relationship can completely erase a person's sense of self. Paul never truly able to discover himself. He could never become a complete person.
